But God . . .

Ephesians 2:4-7 Sunday AM, June 11, 2023

Prelude – Scripture: Ephesians 2:1-7 (NASB95) And you were dead in your trespasses and sins, ² in which you formerly walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air, of the spirit that is now working in the sons of disobedience. ³ Among them we too all formerly lived in the lusts of our flesh, indulging the desires of the flesh and of the mind, and were by nature children of wrath, even as the rest. ⁴ But God, being rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, ⁵ even when we were dead in our transgessions, made us alive together with Christ (by grace you have been saved), ⁶ and raised us up with Him, and seated us with Him in the heavenly *places* in Christ Jesus. ⁷ So that in the ages to come He might show the surpassing riches of His grace in Kindness toward us in Christ Jesus.

Overwhelmed with God's gracious goodness, Paul offers a prayer of thanksgiving to God for these saints at Ephesus. I praise and thank-you God for your great and gracious mercies toward these believers. Help them see more of these blessings so they will be faithful to Your purpose for calling them. Help them not only see this purpose clearly, but upon seeing the human impossibility of faithfulness to that plan, help them see "the surpassing greatness of [Your] power toward us who believe." What kind of power? The kind that is in "accordance with the working of the strength of His might which He brought about in Christ, when He raised Him from the dead and seated Him at His right hand in the heavenly places." And this is the last we hear about us individually in this prayer. The rest of the prayer shows the praiseworthy power and extent of Christ's reign. Our only mention comes if we are found to be under that great and final authority as Christ is proclaimed Head of His body, the church. The focus is on Christ. This is so important, because last weekwe looked at life out from under that authority. It was lived according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air, of the spirit that is not working in the sons of disobedience. These chains kept us busy-living in the lusts of our flesh, indulging the desires of the flesh and of the mind—leaving our world centered on us, shrunk to the size of our desires and personal happiness. And how is this life with its goals and values described? We were by nature, children of wrath—objects of the wrath of God. Why? Because according to the only reality that matters, it is DEAD living-there is separation between us and God and all that results is full of stench and decay. Do you feel the weight of this condition, of life determined based on your life with God shown by your life's focus and desires? John Newton did, and you can hear it in this hymn, first appearing in 1779 in the Olney Hymns, right in the middle of other hymns based on the book of Isaiah—this one perhaps based on Isaiah 53:4-5. The only hope lay in our two powerful words today-But God.

But God did what? Don't rush it this morning, because before we get to what happens to dead objects of wrath, we are called to look away from us. Look at God—look at who He is, look at His disposition toward objects of wrath. ⁴ But God, being rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, ⁵ even when we were dead in our transgressions. Think on holy mercy.

Offering: *Doxology: What did God do? He took dead people, objects of His wrath and made them alive! How did He do that? Does it have to be fully understood before you acknowledge this is the kind of thing that God does? He takes Cyrus, a powerful, ungodly king, and gives Him "a title of honor though you have not known Me." He acts "that men may know from the rising to the setting of the sun that there is no one besides Me. I am the LORD, and there is no other, the One forming light and creating darkness, causing well-being and creating calamity." Who can match His power or question His authority. "Woe to the one who quarrels with his Maker—an earthenware vessel among the vessels of earth! Will the clay say to the potter, 'What are you doing?'" This power exposes idols as foolish emptiness, ¹⁶ They will be put to shame and even humiliated, all of them; The manufacturers of idols will go away together in humiliation. And what is the reason for this show of power? To show His powerful ability to care for His children whether through discipline or deliverance. ¹⁷ Israel has been saved by the LORD With an everlasting salvation; You will not be put to shame or humiliated To all eternity. How should we respond to this great One who saves? Listen to Him, and be reconciled to live under His gracious rule.
