 - 2. Death of Herod Agrippa I: A.D. 44
 - a. Preceded by death of James the Elder
 - b. Preceded by Peter's imprisonment & release
 - 3. Jerusalem Council: A.D. 50
 - 4. Paul's missionary journeys: A.D. 51-58
 - a. Writing of the epistles to the Galatians, Corinthians & Romans: A.D. 56-58.
 - 5. Paul's imprisonment in Caesarea (after being arrested in Jerusalem) during the procuratorship of Felix and Festus (A.D. 58-60.
 - 6. Paul's imprisonment in Rome: A.D. 61-63

7. Writing of epistles to Philippians, Ephesians, Colossians & Philemon during this time.
