- My kingdom, masquerading as God's Kingdom causing me to miss God's priorities
- We have selective faith take parts we want ignore parts don't think we need
- Fear of people holding us to same standard
- Lazy caught up in our own kingdom (schedule, family)
- We don't see Jesus or "all things whatsoever He commanded" as worthy of sharing with others
- Perhaps shows we don't love people as we ought
- Shows we don't value growing "in all aspects to Him who is the head" Eph. 4,
 Rom. 8:29

What does this say about our following Jesus if we are not actively helping others follow Jesus? (CONTINUED)

- Disobedience
- Intentional, won't come naturally
- Find benefits of "product" (benefits of knowing Christ)
- We have different priorities in following Him

What is the progression in 2 Cor. 5?

- Rom. 8 chain Justification, Sanctification, Glorification
- Life with Christ because body dead, 6 therefore's
- Comparing earthly life with heavenly life v. 1-5, Therefore must walk by faith, in earthly because will be judged in heavenly, therefore live pleasing to God v. 6-10
- 1. Groaning in contrast with longing based on promise of God
- 2. We are all preaching something about what will make life work when it is the gospel, it will minimize other priorities
- Everything here is a picture of something heavenly something much greater in heaven with Jesus – we flip it and put our hope in earthly
- V. 10 anchors what is on display (v. 11-13) and how you respond under scrutiny
