Bringing Injustice Before God Pt. 4

Habakkuk 1:2-4, Wednesday, January 17, 2024

THEME: The Path of Faith in the Providence of God What do you think should be the posture we take Before God Pt. 4 in the face of injustice, doubts, fears, and lack of hope?

- 1. Come Before God honestly and humbly.
- 2. Come seeking to submit to God's Word, but make connections to your life with careful precision.
- 3. Avoid the easy route of venting and taking apart. Come prepared to do the hard work to build up your faith.
- 4. Look for areas to meditate and worship.

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- III. It has infiltrated even the institutions set up to bring justice.

How does the law get ignored? What would "justice never upheld" imply?

- Not care about it
- Those in charge of keeping it are violating it as well
- Something 'bigger' than law not upheld because other goals
- Viewpoints have shifted so change laws in line with people

"Now, Israel, what does the LORD your God require from you, but to fear the LORD your God, to walk in all His ways and love Him, and to serve the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul, 13 and to keep the LORD'S commandments and His statutes which I am commanding you today for your good? Deuteronomy 10:12–13

Where do we feel pressure to uphold God's Law, to carry out His will righteously? How does this pressure work/show itself?

- When we've done wrong
- When sinful behavior spoken as natural/to be empathized with
- When unsaved ones call you out to a higher standard
- When get to know God better and see what He sees
- When know God is asking and don't want to or feel can't, unsure
- Growing into our identity as followers of Christ it's what I do, it's who I am

We don't like the results of God's law being ignored, justice never upheld, the wicked surrounding the righteous, and justice coming out perverted, so what are our options? (not just right ones—how do we respond, where do we focus?)

- Shifting focus, try to take it all in
- Blame others, put pressure on others to do, solutions this is what works for me, pragmatic solutions
- Self righteousness quick opinions of justice from a distance or quick demanding of justice if against us
- Finding a livable solution apart from God
- Despair give up hope for anything better
- Does God remain the same in face of all this? If so, we still have responsibility and direction and provision

- Finding God's praiseworthy attributes and actions
- Establish conviction that God's law is unchanging and "for us"
- Be willing to continue under it alone (in the face of ridicule)
- Seeing God's authority (righteousness) is the best good/right way to go
- Greatest need is fellowship with God & therefore lives lived in growing conformity to His holiness
- Repentance (our own and those associated with)
- Obey, seek, study for our good/peace/security
- Doing all this in the face of God (Prayer seeking His presence & help to fulfill the purpose of His Law in our hearts)
- The slow process of picking through the pieces of twisted justice

What would the process of putting God's Word/law in its rightful place in our own lives and then in the lives of God's people include?

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- 2. Acknowledging that God's Word lives because God IS working.
- 3. Quieting other voices in order to listen to the voice of God.
- 4. A longer timetable for Change.

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A mature faith is one that both sees the issues at hand and yet remains steadfast, living in light of God's providence.
