Why eight years in Future Grace?

- Bible is a lifetime book—our life is a journey, what is our attitude through the process of living and checking our lives to be in line with God's purposes
- End goal in SS is to be deeper in our relationship with God and know His love and purposes for us—this book a tool/medium toward this end—key is how we apply it—life shows what that relationship truly is—we are walking Bible—are we really putting ourselves in total submission to our Sovereign God
- Some of us need another 8 years—must deal with present in light of the past (what we have learned about God) should be able to change my mind based on what say believe/have learned about God, then do work to yield so heart comes in line, but this slow/sluggish to actually happen—perhaps need to hear it again
- Difficult to grasp God's timetable versus our own—impatience as look for relevance as feel life is short—
 God dispenses grace and knowledge in His own way—
- Took long time to engage with what going through—end was helpful; used to chapter a week, helpful, but perhaps can lend toward us only grabbing what can relate with putting effort in can help us to examine our assumptions and learn with what thought not immediately relevant

Why eight years in Future Grace? (Continued)

- Lived life far apart from life in Christ—supposed to be a radical change, redirection of worship
- Quick to say "I got it" (danger of thinking get it when perhaps don't in the way they should AND think others not getting it are slowing down our growth and progress) or "I'm never going to get it" (need to reach for it because it matters more than we think)—we give up so quickly
- Foundational chapters needed to come to application chapters
- Often even when we consider growing, grow according to our own categories until someone challenges those categories—i.e. Jonathan Edwards on difference of knowledge of God and experiencing God in your life; definition of future grace
- Don't remember details, but know it was changing view of the Christian life
- One room schoolhouse, all at different places—needing to learn different aspects
- Sloppy—have tendency to do things which keep us from clear thinking (i.e. Lack of sleep, lack of biblical meditation, endless sloppy)
